The financial statements are prepared in accordance with the Companies Act 2014, FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their financial statements in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102).

The Directors' Report contains the information required to be provided in the Directors' Annual Report under the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) guidelines. The directors of the charity are also charity trustees for the purpose of charity law and under the charity's constitution are known as members of the board of trustees.

In this report the directors of The National Association for Youth Drama T/A Youth Theatre Ireland present a summary of its purpose, governance, activities, achievements and finances for the financial year 2022.

The charity is a registered charity and hence the report and results are presented in a form which complies with the requirements of the Companies Act 2014 and, although not obliged to comply with the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland FRS 102, the organisation has implemented its recommendations where relevant in these financial statements.

The charity is limited by guarantee not having a share capital.

#### Mission, Objectives and Strategy

#### **Objectives**

The National Association for Youth Drama t/a Youth Theatre Ireland is the development organisation for youth theatre in Ireland.

Our mission is to empower young people through youth theatre and to provide access to youth theatre to every young person in Ireland. Through our work we ensure that young people are enabled to participate in youth drama by promoting the development of sustainable, quality youth theatre provision throughout Ireland. We do this by:

- Developing and supporting emerging and existing youth theatres to establish structures and policies, access resources, develop their practice and recruit young members.
- Advocating the value of youth drama and the cultural rights of young people at a national level and representing the collective voice of our membership.
- Leading art form and practice development through the provision of training; the creation and dissemination of practice resources; commissioning new work; producing a national youth drama programme; undertaking research; and investing in the development of individual youth drama practitioners.
- Collaborating with local, national, and international stakeholders to promote Irish youth theatre and further its development.

## Review of Activities, Achievements and Performance NATIONAL YOUTH DRAMA PROGRAMME

#### NATIONAL FESTIVAL OF YOUTH THEATRES

The National Festival of Youth Theatres took place in-person in Kilkenny College from the 4th â 8th of July. For 2022 the festival was reduced to 4 days to support people to re-engage with in-person activities. 96 young people from 12 youth theatre groups took part in the festival this year. Participating youth theatres were, Dublin Youth Theatre, Kildare Youth Theatre, Dreamstuff Youth Theatre, Silgo Youth Theatre, Backstage Youth Theatre, Mr. Sands Youth Theatre, County Limerick Youth Theatre, POD Youth Theatre, Act Out Youth Theatre, Roscommon County Youth Theatre, WACT Youth Theatre, Droichead Youth Theatre. Prior to the festival, each group worked with one or two other participating groups in an online partnership project to develop relationships ahead of the festival. This was a project element we retained from the online festivals in 2020 and 2021. Facilitators at the festival were Graham O'Neill, Maxine Acton, Cathal Thomton, Gary Mullen, and Calantha Forde. The festival also had a social programme which included a treasure hunt, onsite theatre performance and disco. There was also a leader's programme, which focused on skills sharing and wellbeing.

#### YOUNG CRITICS PROGRAMME

16 Young Critics took part in our Young Critics Programme in 2022, facilitated by the Youth Theatre Ireland team and Dr. Karen Fricker. After initially meeting online the Young Critics attended the Cork Midsummer Festival in June, with a young critic's panel taking place on the 23rd of June in the Crawford Gallery. The Young Critics met again in October for the final weekend of their 2022 programme. The participants attended Elles Vivent, Lost Lear, and How to be a Dancer during the Dublin Theatre Festival and discussed these productions at the annual young critics panel, chaired by Dr. Karen Fricker at the Dublin Theatre Festival on the 9th of October.

### THE NATIONAL YOUTH THEATRE

Part of the 5-year vision for the National Youth Theatre is to have the National Youth Theatre Production written by a young person. Eimear Hussey was selected from the ARTiculate programme to write the 2022 / 2023 NYT play. This followed a shortlisting and interview process. Niall Cleary was appointed as the Director for the 2022 / 2023 production of the National Youth Theatre. Auditions took place over the summer, with initial workshops taking place in Dublin, Cork, and Galway. These 1st round audition workshops catered to 140 young people from 30 youth theatres across the country. From these 140 young people 44 were asked to return for 2nd round auditions on the 17th and 18th of September in Dublin. From these workshops 16 young people have been chosen as the Performance Ensemble for the upcoming National Youth Theatre. On the 24th of September, an audition workshop, led by Jack Scullion and the National Programme Co-Ordinator, took place to identify the 3 young people to become the Design and Tech Ensemble. All members of the ensemble attended a 5-day residential event from the 31st of October à 4th November in Maynooth University, where they worked with the core artistic team and explored themes for the 2023 production.

### YOUTH BOARD PROGRAMME

The newly designed Youth Board Programme began in February. 11 participants from youth theatres across Ireland worked with Cathal Thornton throughout the year on a number of key areas; The Youth Board selected the theme of 'Change' for the 2022 National Festival, designed and delivered the Youth Theatre Members Forum, launched the inaugural Youth Board Grant Scheme and presented at the Whole Organisation Planning day in December.

#### CRIUNNIÚ NA NÓG 2022

Youth Theatre Ireland participated in the annual Cruinniú na nÓg programme in 2022, with over 50 events taking place with affiliated youth theatre groups across Ireland. Making Waves Youth Theatre were part of the national Cruinniú na NÓg advertising in 2022 and an article in the Irish Times focused on the benefits of youth theatre and in particular, youth theatre alumni who have gone on to have successful careers outside of the Arts

#### PATHWAYS TO PROFESSIONALISM

Pathways to Professionalism was a new programme developed in 2022 to support youth theatre members who are interested in entering into a career in the professional theatre sector. In July we partnered with Dublin Fringe Festival to provide a training and internship programme for young artists interested in design and technical careers in theatre. This programme took place over 5 days in July, with 12 participants working with Jack Scullion, Susie Cummins, and Martha Knight across different areas of Design and Technical skills in Theatre. 2 of the participants on the programme went on to work as Creative Assistants on a production by Hot Brown Honey as part of our partnership with Dublin Fringe Festival in September.

#### SCRIPTS FESTIVAL COLLABORATION

In 2022 we partnered SCRIPTS, Ireland's Playwriting Festival to develop new plays for youth theatre members aged 11-14 years old. This development opportunity was be made available to 3 playwrights under the George B. Miller award. The successful playwrights received dramaturgical support and feedback from industry professionals, to assist them in with crafting their play from initial ideas to page onto the stage. 3 youth theatre groups performed extracts from the 3 selected plays as part of this collaboration at the Playshare event as part of our Symposium in November.

#### INTERNATIONAL PROGRAMME

### **BUZZ NETWORK**

In 2022, in-person activities for the BUZZ network recommenced with Artist Labs taking place in Belgium (April) and Germany (October). 4 youth theatre artists from Ireland were selected to participate in the labs which focused on Co-Creation and Empowering Young People (Belgium) and Form and Aesthetics of Co-Creating with Young People (Germany).

#### TRAINING AND PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

### YOUTH THEATRE ROADHSOW

To assist with the development work of Youth Theatre Ireland, the Deputy Director developed the Youth Theatre Roadshow. The Roadshow offers an insight, through practical demonstrations and discussion, into youth theatre practice and positive impact youth theatre can have on young people. Working with local stakeholders, the Youth Theatre Roadshow took place in Mayo, Cork, Kerry, and Galway in 2022.

#### YOUTH THEATRE PRACTICE SYMPOSIUM

Our annual Symposium, in partnership with UCC, took place on the 18th and 19th of November. Titled, Supporting Inclusion in Youth Theatre a A Youth Theatre Practice Symposium, the programme contained a series of presentations and workshops around creating a more inclusive youth theatre space. Along with informal networking opportunities for participants, excerpts from 3 new plays developed as part of our collaboration with Scripts Ireland were presented along with the launch of our local and national wellbeing resources.

#### QQI ACCREDITED TRAINING

16 participants graduated from our 2020 / 2021 accredited training programme in February, with the graduation event taking place in Wynne's Hotel and attended by Creative Ireland director Tania Banotti. 2021 / 2022 course participants completed their level 6 modules in Engaging with Drama and Leadership in May 2022. All participants passed the training programme and will graduate in early 2023. We had a record number of applicants for our 2022 / 2023 Drama Facilitation training course, which commenced in September. We had 65 applicants for the course, which is the largest number of applicants for this course to date. From these 65, following short listing and interviews, 24 participants were selected. They represent practitioners from across Ireland, and within our targeted areas for development (Kerry, Cork, Offaly, Galway, Donegal).

### QQI Re-engagement

As part of our quality standards, Youth Theatre Ireland took part in a re-engagement process with QQI. This reengagement process examines the QA processes and procedures Youth Theatre Ireland have in place to ensure high quality training for participants. Youth Theatre Ireland worked extensively on the re-engagement process, meeting with the QQI assessment panel in December. The outcome of the panels assessment will be communicated in early 2023, with a 6 month timeline to review and implement any changes recommended by the panel. The process was extremely worthwhile and as part of our long term re-assessment of our organisational QA procedures, we will be implementing elements of the QQI QA processes across the organisation over the coming years.

#### LEADING ONA!

Leading Ona; our residential training for youth theatre leaders, took place in June, facilitated by Oonagh McLaughlin. Feedback from the 18 participants was universally positive, confirming the importance of this training programme for youth theatre leaders across Ireland.

#### WHOLE ORGANISATION MEETING

In December members of the staff team, board and youth board took part in a Whole Organisation Meeting. This meeting, facilitated by Susan Coughlan, examined Youth Theatre Ireland's programmes and our shared vision for the future of youth theatre in Ireland

#### **Financial Review**

The results for the financial year are set out on page 15 and additional notes are provided showing income and expenditure in greater detail.

#### Financial Results

At the end of the financial year the charity has assets of €203,082 (2021 - €226,701) and liabilities of €133,457 (2021 - €146,880). The net assets of the charity have decreased by €(10,196).

### Principal Risks and Uncertainties

As Ireland and the world began to emerge from the COVID19 pandemic in 2022, it was very positive to see a return to in-person youth theatre activities and our own national programmes. In 2023, with a full return to in-person activities we have had to account for increased facilitator and welfare staff costs to provide additional support to young people attending our programmes and increased accommodation, food and transport costs due to cost of living increases. The Directors of Youth Theatre Ireland believe that the main risks associated with delivery of our programmes are budgetary and focus on:

- Additional freelance staff costs
- Increased costs associated with accommodation, food and travel to run our programmes for young people.
- Lack of required increases from funders to deliver our programmes

The company plans to continue its present activities and current activity levels, while examining options to increase funding.

#### **Supports and Services**

#### YOUTH THEATRE SUPPORTS AND GRANTS

In 2022 youth theatres accessed our annual Youth Theatre Support Scheme. This scheme provides small amounts of financial support to our member youth theatres to help them deliver their programme of activities and develop their practice. The scheme was relaunched in September with an updated GoSeeYT grant and the inaugural Youth Board Grant. With thanks to funding as part of the Creative Ireland Youth Theatre Expansion programme, youth theatres availed of Cost of Living and access grants to support their groups and young people who would not ordinarily be able to access youth theatre.

#### LEADERS EAP PROGRAMME

In September we put in place an Employee Assistance Programme for all our leaders of affiliated youth theatres. The scheme extends to the leader, their spouse / partner, and any dependants over 16.

#### OTHER SUPPORTS AND RESOURCES

- Throughout 2022, Youth Theatre Ireland staff continued to provide ongoing support and advice, by phone, email, inperson and online on all aspects of running a youth theatre including funding, artistic programming and planning, welfare issues, recruitment of members/volunteers, development of child protection and welfare policies, strategic planning, governance and compliance, National Quality Standards Framework, etc.
- Continued to operate a Garda Vetting Consortium for members
- Assisted member youth theatres to participate in the National Quality Standards for Volunteer-led Youth Groups.
- Child Protection training for members
- First aid training for staff, facilitators and youth theatre leaders
- As well as providing services to our affiliated youth theatres, Youth Theatre Ireland also provided development support to a wide range of youth drama groups.

### Representation and Advocacy

In 2022 we developed key relationships with Ealain na Gaeltachta to develop youth theatre groups operating through Irish.

### INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

## to the Members of The National Association for Youth Drama T/A Youth Theatre Ireland

### Report on the audit of the financial statements

#### Opinior

We have audited the charity financial statements of The National Association for Youth Drama T/A Youth Theatre Ireland for the financial year ended 31 December 2022 which comprise the Statement of Financial Activities (incorporating an Income and Expenditure Account), the Balance Sheet, the Statement of Cash Flows and the notes to the financial statements, including the summary of significant accounting policies set out in note 2. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is Irish law and FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with FRS 102.

In our opinion the financial statements:

- give a true and fair view of the assets, liabilities and financial position of the charity as at 31 December 2022 and of its deficit for the financial year then ended;
- have been properly prepared in accordance with FRS 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland", as applied in accordance with the provisions of the Companies Act 2014 and having regard to the Charities SORP; and

#### Basis for opinion

#### 1. GENERAL INFORMATION

The National Association for Youth Drama T/A Youth Theatre Ireland is a company limited by guarantee incorporated in the Republic of Ireland. The registered office of the charity is 7 North Great George's Street, Dublin 1, D01 X7Y8 which is also the principal place of business of the charity. The financial statements have been presented in Euro (€) which is also the functional currency of the charity.

#### 2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The following accounting policies have been applied consistently in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to the charity's financial statements.

#### **Basis of preparation**

The financial statements have been prepared on the going concern basis under the historical cost convention, modified to include certain items at fair value. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland FRS 102".

The charity has applied the Charities SORP on a voluntary basis as its application is not a requirement of the current regulations for charities registered in the Republic of Ireland. As permitted by the Companies Act 2014, the charity has varied the standard formats in that act for the Statement of Financial Activities and the Balance Sheet. Departures from the standard formats, as outlined in the Companies Act 2014, are to comply with the requirements of the Charities SORP and are in compliance with section 4.7, 10.6 and 15.2 of that SORP.

#### Statement of compliance

The financial statements of the charity for the financial year ended 31 December 2022 have been prepared on the going concern basis and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland FRS 102".

#### Fund accounting

The following are the categories of funds maintained:

#### Restricted funds

Restricted funds represent income received which can only be used for particular purposes, as specified by the donors. Such purposes are within the overall objectives of the charity.

#### Unrestricted funds

Unrestricted funds consist of General and Designated funds.

- General funds represent amounts which are expendable at the discretion of the board, in furtherance of the objectives of the charity.
- Designated funds comprise unrestricted funds that the board has, at its discretion, set aside for particular purposes. These designations have an administrative purpose only, and do not legally restrict the board's discretion to apply the fund.

#### Income

Income is recognised by inclusion in the Statement of Financial Activities only when the charity is legally entitled to the income, performance conditions attached to the item(s) of income have been met, the amounts involved can be measured with sufficient reliability and it is probable that the income will be received by the charity.

#### Income from charitable activities

Income from charitable activities include income earned from the supply of services under contractual arrangements and from performance related grants which have conditions that specify the provision of particular services to be provided by the charity. Income from government and other co-funders is recognised when the charity is legally entitled to the income because it is fulfilling the conditions contained in the related funding agreements. Where a grant is received in advance, its recognition is deferred and included in creditors. Where entitlement occurs before income is received, it is accrued in debtors.

Grants from governments and other co-funders typically include one of the following types of conditions:

- Performance based conditions: whereby the charity is contractually entitled to funding only to the extent that the core objectives of the grant agreement are achieved. Where the charity is meeting the core objectives of a grant agreement, it recognises the related expenditure, to the extent that it is reimbursable by the donor, as income
- -Time based conditions: whereby the charity is contractually entitled to funding on the condition that it is utilised in a particular period. In these cases the charity recognises the income to the extent it is utilised within the period specified in the agreement.

In the absence of such conditions, assuming that receipt is probable and the amount can be reliably measured, grant income is recognised once the charity is notified of entitlement.

Grants received towards capital expenditure are credited to the Statement of Financial Activities when received or receivable, whichever is earlier.

### Expenditure

Expenditure is analysed between costs of charitable activities and raising funds. The costs of each activity are separately accumulated and disclosed, and analysed according to their major components. Expenditure is recognised when a legal or constructive obligation exists as a result of a past event, a transfer of economic benefits is required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be reliably measured. Support costs are those functions that assist the work of the charity but cannot be attributed to one activity. Such costs are allocated to activities in proportion to staff time spent or other suitable measure for each activity.

#### **Employee benefits**

The company provides a range of benefits to employees, including paid holiday arrangements and defined contribution pension plans.

Short term benefits, including holiday pay and other similar nonmonetary benefits, are recognised as an expense in the period in which the service is received.

The Company operates a defined contribution plan. A defined contribution plan is a pension plan under which the company pays fixed contributions into a separate fund. Under defined contribution plans, the company has no legal or constructive obligations to pay further contributions if the fund does not hold sufficient assets to pay all employees the benefits relating to employee service in the current and prior periods.

For defined contribution plans, the company pays contributions to privately administered pension plans on a contractual or voluntary basis. The company has no further payment obligations once the contributions have been paid. The contributions are recognised as employee benefit expense when they are due. Prepaid contributions are recognised as an asset to the extent that a cash refund or a reduction in the future payments is available.

#### Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost or at valuation, less accumulated depreciation. The charge to depreciation is calculated to write off the original cost or valuation of tangible fixed assets, less their estimated residual value, over their expected useful lives as follows:

Fixtures, fittings and equipment Computer Equipment

- 12.5% Straight line
- 12.5% and 20% Straight line

#### Debtors

Debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due. Income recognised by the charity from government agencies and other co-funders, but not yet received at financial year end, is included in debtors.

#### Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand comprises cash on deposit at banks requiring less than three months notice of withdrawal.

#### Taxation and deferred taxation

No current or deferred taxation arises as the charity has been granted charitable exemption. Irrecoverable valued added tax is expensed as incurred.

#### **Financial Instruments**

Payables are initially recognised at fair value and thereafter stated at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method, unless the effect of discounting would be immaterial, in which case they are stated at cost.

#### Basic financial assets

Basic financial assets, which include debtors and cash and bank balances, are initially measured at transaction price including transaction costs and are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the transaction is measured at the present value of the future receipts discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial assets classified as receivable within one year are not amortised.

#### Basic financial liabilities

Basic financial liabilities, including creditors and bank loans are initially recognised at transaction price unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the debt instrument is measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial liabilities classified as payable within one year are not amortised.

Debt instruments are subsequently carried at amortised cost, using the effective interest rate method.

Trade creditors are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of operations from suppliers. Amounts payable are classified as current liabilities if payment is due within one year or less. If not, they are presented as non-current liabilities. Trade creditors are recognised initially at transaction price and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

### Derecognition of financial liabilities

Financial liabilities are derecognised when the company's contractual obligations expire or are discharged or cancelled.
